Year in Review - 2024

This annual report for 2024 provides a comprehensive overview of MacKillop Catholic College for parents, students and wider community. Hard copies of this report are available upon request at the College Office.

Introduction

MacKillop Catholic College is located in Mornington, Tasmania. It is bounded by Currajong Street and Goondi Street. It is a Catholic co-educational college governed by Catholic Education Commission Tasmania catering for students from Year 7 to Year 12. Although discussions about the possibility of establishing a Catholic secondary college on the eastern shore of Hobart had taken place as early as 1962, it was not until the planned restructuring of Catholic secondary education in the Hobart region commenced in the early 1990s that the opportunity arose to establish MacKillop Catholic College. MacKillop Catholic College opened in the refurbished site on 9 February 1994. The College opened its doors to 59 students in 1994. By 1997 student numbers had risen to 340, in 1998 there were over 400 students. By 2006 there were 560 students. In 2024 there are 811 students.



LEARNING and TEACHING

At MacKillop Catholic College we are committed to quality teaching and professional practice that challenges each student to realise their full potential and achieve personal success in their learning. The curriculum is broad and includes vocational and academic learning pathways.



In addition to our formal classroom learning, there is a large range of co-curricular activities and competitions that students participate. All these opportunities enhance and extend the learning that occurs within our formal classes. This year we have had a number of students acknowledged for their outstanding effort and achievement, including;

- Elliott Stee was awarded the State Champion Medal in The Australian History Competition and won a place at the 2024 Geography's Big Week Out from his participation in the Australian Geography Competition.
- Isabella Patten received a High Distinction in the Australian Geography Competition.
- Stella England was awarded the State Champion Medal in the ICAS Writing Competition.
- Dexter Derrick, Harriet Verdouw, Samuel Braid, Stella England and Elliott Stee, all made it to the National Level judging for the National History Competition.
- 19 of our Year 12 Graduates received early offers from the University of Tasmania for 2025 via the School Recommendation Program.
- Our College Dux was Lachlan Macgill with a TCE score of 115.4 and an ATAR of 99.35. Lachlan's ATAR put him in the top 100 in Tasmania.
- 2 students achieved an ATAR of 90 or above. 5 students achieved an ATAR of 80 or above and 7 students achieved an ATAR of 70 or above.
- 2 VET students, Lachlan Denholm and William Gavin were awarded an Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification (TASC) Outstanding Achievement in Vocational Education and Training (VET) Award.

Curriculum

With an increasing number of students staying to study Year 11 and 12 at MacKillop Catholic College, the number of subjects offered in Year 11 and 12 grew. 2024 saw growth in our Vocational Educational and Training (VET) courses, with Certificate 1 in Maritime Operations and Certificate II in Sports Coaching. In addition to new TASC courses, such as Economics, Physics and Chemistry. Our Year 7-10 curriculum continues to ensure our students establish the foundations for academic success into the future. Year 10 has a strong focus on preparing our students for Years 11 and 12, with all students participating in work experience and transition weeks, to enable all students to make informed decisions about their pathway for Year 11 and 12.

Senior Secondary Educational Outcomes

Vocational Education: 50% of Year 12 students participated in a VET program.

Two VET students were awarded an Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification (TASC) Outstanding Achievement in Vocational Education and Training (VET) Award for 2024.

Tasmanian Certificate of Education: 96% of Year 12 students achieved their Tasmanian Certificate of Education (TCE) or TCEA

ATAR: 54% of Year 12 students received an ATAR. The College Dux in 2024 achieved a TE Score of 115.4 and an ATAR of 99.35, placing them in the top 100 in Tasmania. 8% students achieved an ATAR of 90 or above, 19% students achieved an ATAR of 80 or above and 27% students achieved an ATAR of 70 or above.

* TCE and ATAR calculations are based on 26 students and not 27, as one of the students that completed year 12 at MacKillop didn't do year 11 at MacKillop and in one year we couldn't help them complete the 120 credit points required for TCE. We calculated percentages on the 26 students that completed year 11 and 12 at MacKillop.

NAPLAN

Our NAPLAN results indicated that the College is performing at a consistently high level when compared with Tasmanian schools. Our Year 7 students achieved a higher percentage than Tasmanian schools in all 5 areas, Numeracy, Reading, Writing, Spelling and Grammar and Punctuation. Also achieving higher than Australian schools in Reading, Spelling and Grammar and Punctuation.

While our Year 9 students achieved higher percentages than Tasmanian and Australian schools in all 5 areas.

teaching on highly efficient and effective strategies that improve student learning and student outcomes.

WELLBEING

2024 saw a significant growth and reflection for our College community. As we continued to shape a positive and supportive environment for all students, we introduced several key initiatives designed to enhance wellbeing, foster student engagement, and celebrate success across the school.

One of the most impactful changes was the introduction of the Positive Behaviour Framework. This framework aims to foster a culture of respect, responsibility, and resilience, encouraging students to take pride in their actions and contribute to a positive school climate. Through a combination of clear expectations, positive reinforcement, and support systems, we have seen a marked improvement in student behaviour, engagement, and overall wellbeing. It has been inspiring to witness students taking ownership of their actions and showing a renewed commitment to their personal growth and the success of their peers.

In response to valuable student feedback, we also undertook a revision of our Code of Personal Appearance. Students expressed a desire for greater clarity and a more inclusive approach to uniform standards, and we worked collaboratively to address these concerns. The updated code respects individual identity while maintaining a sense of unity and pride in our school community. This revision has been well received and has reinforced our commitment to creating a respectful, inclusive environment where all students feel valued. A key initiative in creating a focused and distraction-free learning environment was the introduction of a Mobile Phone Protocol, which requires students to put their phones away during school hours. This decision was made to reduce distractions and support students in maintaining concentration and engagement in their studies.

While students have adapted to this new protocol, it has already made a noticeable difference in classroom dynamics, with fewer disruptions and more productive learning time.

Another exciting development was the introduction of regular weekly assemblies to celebrate student achievement and success. These assemblies became a central part of our school culture, offering a platform to recognise academic excellence, leadership, and personal growth. Additionally, we introduced more regular House Assemblies, which have helped build stronger connections between students across year groups. These House events have fostered a sense of community, pride, and healthy competition, contributing to a positive school spirit.

We were incredibly proud to mark the graduation of our very first Year 12 cohort. This milestone is a significant achievement for our College, and we were immensely proud of the resilience, determination, and hard work demonstrated by our inaugural Year 12 students. Their success is a testament to the values we hold dear and the support we have provided along the way. 2024 was one of transformation and celebration.

LEARNING ENHANCEMENT

It was a year full of action in the Learning Enhancement Team at MacKillop Catholic College for 2024. CAREERS and PATHWAYS

We started 2024 by working with our Year 10 students and introducing them to the Creating Futures Program which focused on transition into Years 11 and 12 as well as their work experience weeks. We had over 170 Year 10 students go out for work experience to a variety of industries, including Paramedicine, Radiology, Real Estate, Theatre Performance, Aquaculture and more!

Our Year 10 Transition Weeks were packed with activities and excursions that helped our Year 10s understand more about their subject choices, future pathways and options available. Students most notably enjoyed the day trip to the University of Tasmania (UTAS) Sandy Bay Campus, guest speakers and an introduction to their Year 11 and 12 courses.

We had the opportunity to go on many fantastic Career and Pathway excursions throughout the year, in particular the UTAS Medical Sciences and Health Sciences Taster Days, the Southern Catholic College's Careers Showcase, Hydro Tasmania's Girls in Power Program and many more. Excursions are such a wonderful way our students can be immersed in seeing how a future career may look and feel – this was certainly the case at the UTAS Medical Science Taster Day when students acted as patients and applied plaster to each other, or on the Hydro Tasmania Girl's in Power Program when students toured the entire Meadowbank Power Station and felt the raw effects of the dam like workers do.

The College's relationship with UTAS has continued to grow with the recruitment team paying regular visits to our Year 11 and 12s to assist them with their university questions and queries. As we progressed through the year, we assisted our Year 12 students who were applying to university to put an application into the UTAS Schools Recommendation Program to allow them early entry based on their performance at MacKillop through their time in Year 11 and 12. We were beyond happy to receive the news in September that all applicants received an offer to one or more of their chosen courses, in areas such as Nursing, Education, Business, Social Work and more.

We also continued to strengthen our relationship with providers Maxima and Possibility to offer a range of students in our Learning Enhancement area the opportunity for more tailored career plans. Both these organisations have worked with MacKillop to offer pathways to employment plans that are assisted by support workers and tailored to the needs of the student. It is wonderful to be able to offer Careers and Pathways assistance to all students and families at the College.

Careers and Pathways continued to work closely with the Vocational Education and Training (VET) Department at MacKillop and it has been great to see even more students excelling in this space. We have had several students complete VET specific work experience and placements in areas such as Hospitality, Electrotechnology, Construction, Maritime and more. We have had a significant increase in interest for School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships after the success of many students participating in this model of learning. In 2024, we had students placed in areas such as Information Technology, Early Childhood Education, Automotive, Early Education and more.

Overall, it was a fantastic year with many opportunities for our students.

LEARNING EXTENSION

In 2024 we continued our approach of identifying high academic ability at MacKillop Catholic College, using multiple tools and avenues to identify high ability in a range of areas. A diversified approach to identification allows us to identify students with high ability in particular areas, as well as those with high ability in multiple areas. One of our focusses in 2024 was to offer a range of extracurricular opportunities for high ability students to thrive, both individually and in teams.

Students identified as high ability in Science and English were a priority in 2024. Kaleidoscope Science was the Semester 1 program created for students with strong skills and an interest in a range of areas in the sciences. In Semester 2, a creative writing program was undertaken with our students who have demonstrated a high ability in English. Both of these programs culminated in enriching excursions, a tradition we look forward to continuing in 2025.

Learning Leaders also offered many opportunities for high ability students to shine in subject specific area competitions. These included ACER, ICAS, Australian Mathematics Competition, History and Geography competitions, and a new entry - BEBRAS Computational Thinking Challenge. Other academic extracurricular programs offered in 2024 included Chess, Da-Vinci Decathlon, Debating, Ethics Olympiad, Philosothon, and Rostrum.

The Learning Extension Team looks forward to supporting MacKillop Catholic College students to develop their diverse skills and continue to explore areas of interest into 2025 and beyond.
